Duff married and as Mrs.M.Lavergne set off on her travels round the world with her husband and was replaced by Mrs.J.Law; Mrs.J.Martin resigned to take up family life and later will accompany her husband and small son to Wales and Mrs.B.Colley joined the staff in her place. so you will agree with me that 1967 is certainly a year of change. Then, too, during 1967 the School buildings and grounds began to undergo a change that will continue for many months to come. The four houses, purchased by the Department of Education on land adjoining the school fronting Church and Princess Streets, were demolished and the land was cleared, levelled and fenced and is now included in the property.

A modern demountable class room was erected, in a matter of hours on newly constructed brick foundations. This we decided to make a 6th Form class room and every 6th Former has spent some time therein.

A double portable room was transferred to the school and placed in position on the newly acquired land. This has been fitted up as a Science Laboratory which has been used constantly ever since. Actually it was being used before the workmen had completed the fittings in the adjoining store rooms, so great was our need.

During this year also plans have been drawn and approved for considerable extensions to the school building. Two new wings containing a Library, special Art rooms, Science Laboratories, senior study rooms, special rooms for Activity classes and other much needed

amenities including a Tuck Shop and sheltered playground area are planned and are to be completed and ready for use in 1969.

The new junior summer uniform is being worn this year and is proving all we hoped it would be, serviceable, smart and comfortable. And what could be smarter than the new senior uniform which is being purchased by more and more 5th Formers and being worn with such evident pride. In fact, we have become so school and uniform conscious that we won the march past at the Zone Athletic Carnival this year and felt justly proud.



The P.& C.Association, a very small group of dedicated parents, made a very generous donation of \$500 towards the purchase of an electronic scanner early this year. Already we are wondering how we could have managed without it to cut stencils for the almost countless and complicated examination papers and notes and information for senior and junior alike. In fact we have found it invaluable.

The P.& C.Association Mothers also conducted a very successful Market Day at the school, which raised well over \$400. The monthly Cake Stalls proved very successful fund raisers - another P.& C.ladies project.

The Tuck Shop Association, in July of this year paid \$1500 into school funds. Mrs. Frost and her group of Mothers, who give their services voluntarily each week, have worked tirelessly for the School.

This year too saw the beginning of the School Newspaper 'The Canterbury Crier'. Fifth Form girls form the Editorial Committee and produce the paper under the careful guidance of Mr. Condon and Miss A. Smith.

1967 is a very special year in that it marks the completion of the first phase of the Wyndham Scheme of Secondary Education. Our fifty seven 6th Formers, who are the pioneers of the Scheme within our School, were given a delightful party to mark the completion of their six years at the school.


## FIFTH FORM SOCIAL COMMITTEE


