### 1968 - A Year of Development.

This year will be remembered most for the fact that during it work was commenced on the extensions and alterations to the school buildings. The school has watched and heard the new wings take shape and now eagerly awaits the completion of the work. The changes to be made to the original buildings will include fluorescent lighting throughout, conversion of the old library room to a music room and other alterations such as conversion of a class room to administrative offices and construction of change rooms for P.E. in the present tuck shop area. Locker rooms are to be added in the two quadrangles.

Changes in staff have occurred in almost all departments. Mrs. G. Humphreys was appointed School Principal when Miss H. Gordon transferred to Cremorene Girls' High School.

Mrs. A. Mathers was appointed Mistress of the Department of Languages when Mrs. J. Gallo transferred to another school.

Mrs. G. Cassidy was appointed School Counsellor when Mrs. D. Rowe went overseas.

New Appointments to the Science Staff were Miss E. Weiner, Mrs. D. Bloomfield, Mrs. K. Wasley, who replaced Mrs. G. Mann, Mr. P. Kavanagh and Miss G. Evenhuis respectively. Mrs. S. Hofmann was an additional appointment to the Science Staff.

On the English and History Staff Mrs. C. Boyle replaced Mrs. J. Law and Mrs. S. Woolfe replaced Miss A. Smith.

Mrs. A. Bookallilil replaced Miss C. Smith and Mrs. N. Evans replaced Mrs. B. Follington on the Mathematics Staff.

Miss J. Mendelsohn of the Language Staff went overseas in April and was replaced temporarily by Mr. G. Dan and later by Mr. A. Todero.

On the Commerce/Geography Staff Mrs. J. Murphy was replaced by Miss A. Innis and Miss S. Witt replaced Miss C. Freeman. Miss M. Russell who had replaced Mrs. C. Andrews returned to Canada owing to illness in her family and Miss S. Shakeshaft joined the staff.

Mrs. L. Waterson was replaced by Mrs. N. Shelley on the Needlework Staff.

Early in the year Miss D. Spain who had replaced Miss J. Langstone was transferred to the country to teach Art and Mrs. L. Da Silva was appointed in her place.

Mrs. T. Crnkovic is on leave from the Art Staff and has been

replaced by Miss C. McNeil.

Miss A. Cliffe joined our Music Staff in place of Mrs. B. Vale who had temporarily replaced Mrs. L. Vassiliou.

As a result of suggestions made in past years and the careful research of the Needlework Mistress the winter uniform for the Junior School was altered to a blue fabric similar to the Senior girls' uniform and constructed on the same pattern as the summer uniform. For new girls in 1969 the P.E. uniform has been redesigned for better comfort and appearance.

Of greater importance than the buildings in which a school works and the uniforms worn by the girls are the people themselves within the school and the group of parents who devote their time to the smooth functioning of the school and the provision of extra amenities. This year the P. & C. Association has, as in the past, made very generous donations to the school for the purchase of equipment and library books. The Tuck Shop Association under the management of Mrs. Frost and Mrs. Walsh has been able to contribute generously to school funds. The tireless group of mothers who give their services voluntarily have made the functioning of the tuck shop possible. The school looks forward to seeing them accommodated much more comfortably in the new premises next year.

In Education Week the Director of Education for St. George District, Mr. C. G. Meckiff, gave an interesting address to the parents concerning vocations for young people. Groups of girls displayed their research material concerning careers in the fields of their own particular interests and a great number of parents held discussions with the School Counsellor, the Careers Adviser and the Youth Officer of the Commonwealth Employment Service, and teachers.

The School Newspaper "The Canterbury Crier" has been issued monthly under the enthusiastic guidance of the Editorial Committee of Fifth Form girls. It has served as a means of communication for the girls and has kept them informed of the many aspects of school life.

This year has been a very active year for all departments of the school. The reports which follow in this issue of the Year Book lend firm support to this statement.



### Choral Activities.

The choir's activities this year began with an Easter Programme presented in conjunction with the I.S.C.F. Then, as is the custom, our choir combined with Canterbury Boys' High, for the Annual Anzac Eve Memorial Service in Hyde Park.

After a successful audition, the madrigal group and vocal trio, sang as soloists at the Combined Secondary Schools' Choral Concert in August. Thirty members of the school choir sang in the combined chorus. This concert was televised by A.B.N., and highlights, including the madrigal group's two items, were shown during Education Week.

In September, the choir entered two sections of the Sydney 'Young Eisteddfod', one of the items being selected for the A.B.C.'s "Young Australia" programme. The following Sunday afternoon fifty members of the choir sang at the Lyceum Platform, an inter-denominational current affairs programme, for which we provided thirty minutes of music.

The vocal trio and duet, together with the madrigal group were successfully auditioned by the A.B.C., for a fifteen minute programme, to be recorded for "Young Australia". As a result of this recording, we were thrilled to learn that the madrigal group had been selected as the Australian entry for 1969, in the Youth Section of the international choral competition "Let the People Sing," which is directed by the B.B.C. (London) - an inspiring conclusion to our year's activities.



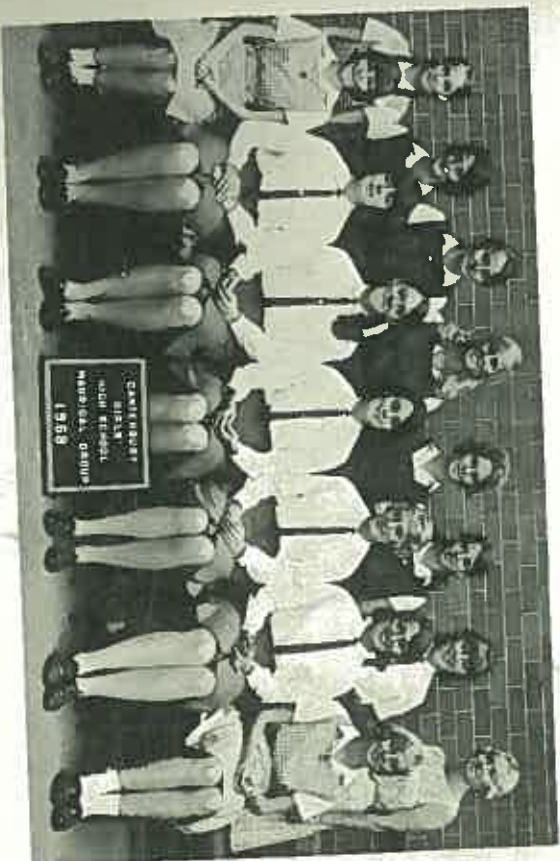
### Mathematics.

1968 has been marked by several interesting events in the Mathematics Department.

For the first time, excursions were arranged, one to a Computer Centre and one to the Bureau of Meteorology. The former was particularly interesting and informative.

A Mathematics Club was established in the second term and is now flourishing. The Club, whose members are very keen, meets on Friday afternoons after school.

This year we had a record number of entries for the University of N.S.W. Mathematics Competition. Although this was the first time for a number of years that no award was won by Canterbury, the girls gained valuable experience, and we were gratified to read the University's report that the standard of this year's entries was exceptionally high.



Junior Debating Society.

Our Junior Debating team with the able guidance of Mrs. Jubb has had a very successful year. The team competed in Zone J of the Teasdale Competition against Canterbury Boys' High School, Dulwich High School, Condell Park High School and Enmore Boys' High School.

Our team won the Zone pennant by being undefeated in the four debates. Success was also gained against Sefton High School in the first quarter final, but our girls were eliminated in the second quarter final by the team from Fort Street Boys' High School. The Fort Street team was eventually defeated in the final by Fairfield Boys' High School.

Our fourth form speakers gained valuable experience in this competition and are very keen to continue debating against more senior competition.

The School Library.

The library girls have voluntarily given their time before school and in the lunch hour to the many tasks required. Books have been labelled, covered and processed; magazines have been catalogued and circulated to staff members; old books have been withdrawn and many repaired. The whole staff is looking forward to having a new library next year, and to having a work-room. Mrs. Le Marnne would like to thank all the girls who have worked so cheerfully and so constantly throughout the year.

The School Newspaper.

Editions of "The Canterbury Crier" were published by a hard working editorial committee from fifth form. The format of the paper was changed this year to consist of ten quarto pages. Regular features such as: interviews with notable celebrities, Cora's Corner and the ever popular "Wise Willy", have provided continued interest to all readers. ### Language Department.

### Needlework.

As part of Education Week Activities, second, fourth and sixth form girls were invited to take part in a fashion parade at the Trocadero. The Sixth Form Vice - Captain Merilyn Burman, was the comper of three sections of the parade: colours of the spectrum, domino and moonlight and romance. More than 2,000 people, including the Director General of Education, Dr. H. S. Wymndham, crowded into the Trocadero to see 200 girls from 20 high schools show the clothes that they had designed and made.

The Home Economics Association of New South Wales invited Canterbury girls to display their books and needlework at the Second Triennial Conference held from 26th to 30th August, 1968 at Sydney Teachers' College. Overseas and interstate visitors to the conference were impressed by the high standard of the work exhibited.

The girls were also invited to present their embroidery for a comprehensive display of Art Needlework held at the Sky-Walk of Australia Square from 8th October to 15th October, 1968. Teachers, students and their friends visited this attractive display.

### Home Science.

What's new in Home Economics? There's always something new in Home Economics because it is so intimately connected with life itself, and we live in a world of change.

Housing and Home Exhibitions, T.V. programmes, advertising, magazines and periodicals all display new techniques and up to date ideas for the benefit of the future homemaker.

During the year, our Fourth Form girls have been on two excursions with Mrs. Burdon. In April, they went to the Daily Telegraph Homes Exhibition and saw the modern developments in homes. In June, they went to see the organization of the Qantas Catering Service and visited the kitchens of the various airlines. This outing supplemented the study of home management which is an important part of the Fourth Form syllabus.

### I.S.C.F. Inter School Christian Fellowship.

This year we were pleased to welcome Mrs. Wasley to the Counsellor's position. The group met in Junior and Senior groups on Wednesdays with an average of 60 over the year. The First Form welcome after school was a great success as was the Houseparty at Galston Gorge in May. ### SCIENCE REPORT.

Several excursions were held during the year. Form II went to Bondi, senior biology students went to the Zoo, and Forms V and VI spent a wet day at Kiama. This area is in the grip of a severe drought - we should go more often.

Next year if all goes according to plan the new science wing should be completed giving us improved laboratory conditions in which to work. The area immediately in front of the building will be used as an experimental garden, mainly for the use of students.

All in all we hope that next year science will take on a new look with more experimental work and pupil participation.



Department of Geography and Commerce.

Fieldwork is an essential and rewarding part of the study courses in this department. During the year groups from most forms were able to take advantage of the excellent opportunities available. Mrs. Woodorth and Miss Witt took groups from Fourth Form Commerce and Senior Economics respectively on a tour of the Stock Exchange during the first term. In second term a Third Form Geography group, with Miss Bryan and Mr. Wilcox, made a tour of inspection of the Port Kembla Steelworks. This proved to be an interesting and profitable day.

Also in second term the Sixth Form Geography students accompanied by Mr. Wilcox were able to make comprehensive tours of the British Motor Corporation works as an example of complex processing, and the Smiths Potato Crisps factory as an example of simple processing. The students were received very well by both firms and we thank them most sincerely for their consideration and effort.

The Second Form Geography group spent a day at the Taronga Park Zoo where the Education staff gave them a talk on the relationship between vegetation, climate and animal life before inspecting the park. The Second Form Commerce group, with Miss Innis, were shown over the local Canterbury Post Office, and our thanks go to the Postmaster for the time and trouble he took to make the visit an enjoyable and profitable one for the students.

A group of the Level I Economics students attended a Seminar at the University of Sydney during the holidays. Students from the Commerce classes staffed the school bank once again during the year providing a service for their fellow students as well as learning a valuable lesson in accurate clerical work themselves. The Department was also active in such school activities as Education Week, and other school functions.

The Art Department.

During the year the Third Form art elective students attended a lecture at the Art Gallery.

Next year the Art Department anticipates deservng its makeshift accommodation and outposts for new art rooms in the extensions to the school now being built.

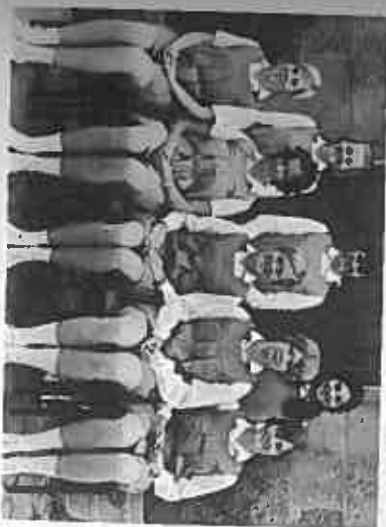
Canberra House Report.
